Commodore's Comments

Normally at this time of year I would be reflecting on the concluding season. Not this year! The season is full swing. Explorer is still taking bookings and Ploes even has a booking in November.

This year's usage has been at record levels for both boats. Explorer's summer cruise was a huge success (again) and the "Ploes Experience" weeks have enabled more members to access our wonderful boat in the Med. Both are reported in detail below.

Membership is growing. Seven new memberships approved in September alone. This and boat usage has meant that our finances are in good shape. Not perhaps back to the pre-pandemic level but well on the way to recovery.

Activity within the club is vibrant, not just on the various social media channels but also social sails and for the first time in many years a summer get-together with twenty-two members gathering for an informal dinner, followed by a quiz at the Lightship at SYH on 10th September.

This provides a firm foundation for the future. The boat replacement subgroup has analysed the results of the survey, which had an excellent 77% return rate. The findings have been discussed at a special committee meeting and there will be a full debate on boat replacement options at the AGM on the 12th November before the Laying Up Supper.

So - much achieved this year thanks to the commitment and hard work of many members and much to look forward to.

Explorer

Another excellent year for Explorer!! One hundred twenty two (122!) days booked since the last AGM, of which 5 were taster sails and 6 were skills days and skipper accreditations. We still have a month left until the next AGM so the tally may go up further.

Explorer got off to a cracking start this season with a trip to Ostende crewed by Paul Newman, Chris Jones, Gill Green and Steve Bird. On her return she was lifted out for a few days at SYH for antifouling, hull inspection and adjustment to the furling drum height.

All was going well until the inevitable last minute pre summer cruise panic. A chain plate U bolt failed 3 weeks before the start of the cruise and the engine suffered overheating problems. The latter was traced to a loose jubilee clip on a coolant hose which was an easy fix. The former meant Paul sourcing replacement plates from Jeremy Rogers Ltd and then a rapid refit by volunteers. The backstay chainplate will be replaced this winter when she is lifted out for antifouling.

Talking of volunteers, thanks go to Paul, Chris, Colin, Arthur R, Arthur N, Clare Giles, Gill, Norman, Peter, Mark T, Robin, Helen and myself who have all made special trips to the boat to carry out maintenance this year.

The summer cruise passed off with almost no issues and there was still a strong appetite for sailing when she returned in early August. In fact, there were only eight days in August and six days in September when the boat wasn't being used. There is still availability in October and nothing booked over the winter... so far!

Unfortunately, last month, the mainsail decided it was too old to carry on and ripped in a couple of places. We are incredibly thankful to longstanding members Bob and Jean Shackleton, who by chance donated their old mainsail to Explorer from their identical boat a couple of years ago. It attaches to the mast by way of sliders as opposed to the previous bolt rope method. Chris Jones was able to purchase a new mast gate for the sliders for about £50, and fit it. An excellent solution all round and has saved us buying a new main, at least for the time being.

From now until spring it's important that we keep the boat free from condensation below decks as far as possible. To that end could you please connect to shore power at the end of your trip and plug in the tube heater. Also leave a condensation water trap in the heads sink, leave the forward hatch open 10mm and wedge the forepeak cushions up on their sides to dry out underneath.

Also connect the battery chargers.



Don't forget to add a quarter teaspoon of Marine 16 to the diesel tank prior to filling up.

And finally, after 5 years in the job, I will be passing the mantle of Explorer maintenance co-ordinator to Paul Newman from the AGM. I will continue to administer the bookings.

Ploes

Ploes is having an exceptionally good year, she has 16 weeks booked, one a delayed booking from 3 years ago and 1 as a houseboat, but that is a total of 14 fully paid for weeks. We will have had 41 members sailing on Ploes this year, that also is a record and it is excellent for the future, giving more members a taste of sailing on Ploes and very helpful for future bookings next year. We even have a booking in late October to early November this year.

Ploes has been relatively trouble free since the last report. Work has been done on the electrics and a new diode splitter fitted. The bow thruster battery is now back being charged by the diesel engine and all charging has been double checked. We also have had the gas cooker hoses replaced and the cooker serviced. The hoses would have been original from 20 years ago. The fridge lid has also been resealed and the fridge is working well.

Chris Jones has been on Ploes recently and he had issues with the anchor winch. He quickly identified this as a corroded cable feeding the winch stopping it from retrieving the anchor. He has done an excellent job in repairing this and we will need to assess the other heavy cables feeding the winch. These cables were repaired in Paros back in 2009. We will assess what further work is needed on these and other DC cables later in this autumn.

We will have had 7 Committee members sailing on Ploes the last 12 months and all members of the committee will have sailed on her in the last 10 years. It is excellent that so many of us are familiar with Ploes. This will help assess what improvements we can make to her after an excellent financial year. I am also confident that next year will be another excellent year and we can look to a bright future.

We have purchased and fitted an Epirb for Ploes. Although luckily not as important for safety in the Mediterranean, a reassuring device to have on board. I do not anticipate any more major expenditure for now. Everything due this financial year is



already paid for and we will finish the year in a strong financial position. There are some items like the cooker at 300 Euros but these may appear in next year's financial payments. It depends on the timing of Claire's next invoice.

Overall, a record year for Ploes for income and usage, plus excellent foundations laid by the Ploes experience weeks for future use of Ploes by our members.

Explorers Summer Cruise

The Summer Cruise 2022 was another cracker. Organised by Cliff with the right blend of patience, understanding and steely resolve. Over 7 weeks 7 skippers and 17 crew, sailed over 1000 miles to Scilly isles and back. Each week could fill a newsletter with their exploits, so this is a selection.

This was our first summer cruise. It was a delight setting off to explore unknown waters. What was less delightful was the weather forecast and a huge cross-tide as we reversed out into a river in full flow running through the marina. Needless to say, our exit from Weymouth was quick and the F5/6 meant conditions were just the right side of brutal. The wind was behind us but we ran out of tide so the resulting wind over tide sea conditions were spectacular. So, Poole was a haven. Pip Hare's boat Medallia was there, being up close to a foiling ocean racer was sufficient reward for our passage. Next day's passage was to Yarmouth via a swim in Studland Bay and then through the Needles channel catching a couple of fine mackerel on the way, that was dinner sorted. The sail from Yarmouth to Portsmouth was first serene, then bonkers as we went sideways past Bramble Bank then hairy as we skated in F5 across the sandbanks to find the entrance channel to Portsmouth.

Rose left and friends Rick and Jack joined. We braved the entrance to Bembridge, very pretty. Next day a pleasant sail to the mouth of Chichester Harbour, more mackerel, and a sea bass. Our final day started at first light with a nail-biting crawl along a shallowing channel to exit into the main river. We made Shoreham in 6 hours, too much under engine but pleased to be in, although the washing machine effect of the locks gave us some last-minute excitement.

We hoped to go to Guernsey and Sark but forecast of strong northerlies later in the week (which did not actually transpire) meant it might be hard work getting back. Instead, we had a lovely cruise of the lovely rias of Dorset, Devon and Cornwall. We stopped at Plymouth, Fowey, Falmouth, Dartmouth, Portland Harbour, Lulworth Cove and Weymouth.

We saw dolphins on average once per day, when west of Portland, in pods of 4 to 6. Sometimes swam alongside for an hour or so, sometimes their paths just crossed with ours. Mostly swam quite shallow and jumped to breathe once or twice per minute. We did quite a lot of walking ashore. The highlight of the week for me was swimming ashore in Lulworth Cove, followed by a fast reach, close to the Jurassic Coast, back to Weymouth on the final day.



One challenge is conquering queasiness. I think the main solutions are: no tea or coffee (just keep water bottle handy); skip breakfast; minimise smells (bilges, maintenance solvents etc.); minimal alcohol night before; keep lunch snacks and sandwiches in handy location for consumption while underway; put on more clothing than you think necessary before leaving port.
