Capella



This year has seen one of those momentous events in the club's history. After 30 years we have changed our trusty Contessa 32, Explorer for a new, more modern and more comfortable boat. A boat which will ensure the future of the club.

Following the decision at the AGM in November, things moved fast. Key to our purchase strategy was funding by members loans together with the sale of Explorer and the cashing in of our existing investments. We set about finding the right sort of boat for the club, and in doing so we learned a lot.

Trawling through what brokers had on offer was dispiriting. In a strong seller market some boats were being bought unseen and the rest seemed tired. And then serendipity took a hand.

On 26th February, a drab Sunday morning, one of the purchase committee members took part in a walk followed by lunch with members of Adastral Park Sailing Club, to forge closer links between the clubs. Conversation inevitably turned toward the club's intention to change our club boat in the near future. Members of APSC were empathic regarding the frustrating search for the right boat, the differences between the solid and robust boats of Explorer's generation and the difficulties that some members might have in moving to a more modern, wider beamed boat.



We discussed potential models and designs but lamented that there was just nothing available on the market, forcing us to review our search parameters. So, a few APSC owners offered us the opportunity to view a variety of boats for our research purposes. Capella, at this point, was neither for sale nor within our budget. Her owners, however, Conrad and Alison were kind enough to offer a viewing in order for us to judge the build quality and interior of a Dufour 365 - a model that had not previously been on the Boat Replacement Committee's radar.

Extremely well cared for since her previous owners bought her from new, Capella shows her wide and uncluttered side decks allowing safe and easy access to the foredeck.





Once seen for the first time we realised that this immaculate boat, with such positive reviews all round, was ideal for KSSC's future. Within days the owners had considered their plans and had decided to sell in order to take up new opportunities. The committee decided to "reach for the stars", negotiations were concluded and a deal was struck.

Having agreed the purchase in principle, we organized a trial sail, initially delayed by some capricious East Coast weather but eventually, on a sunny though cold Monday morning, we set off. Footage of that sail can be seen on the Capella video on the website. Two things became apparent. Firstly, the sellers, Conrad and Alison, were engaging, open and helpful and had maintained Capella to a very high standard, and secondly, Capella sailed as well as she looked. Out beyond Languard point we had 20 Kts of wind with a full main and genoa and yet she was nowhere near having her lee rail in the water. The single line reefing system made life very easy and all can be



done from the cockpit. Tacking back up the Orwell showed her to be close winded and easy to tack.

The survey was completed the following day with a lift out at Shotley in appalling weather! No serious issues were found and the sale was due to complete a few days later. However we had not factored in the bank's anti-fraud measures meaning that as soon as the payment was made the funds were frozen until the bank had spoken to us. Had we seen the boat? Are we sure the people are real? Did we understand that if this was a scam the bank would not be liable! Reassuring it may be but with two payments going through this process and a number of bank holidays in the mix, eventual payment was not made until after Easter.

The boat replacement team put into effect a massive list of actions: familiarization sessions were held for skippers living close by, operating instructions were produced at terrific speed (thanks Norman and Chris). A real team effort meant that by the time we had Explorer lifted out on 26 April the new boat was fully operational and ready to go.

Bookings have been flooding in and whilst the system designed for Explorer is coping, we will have to keep an eye on it to ensure that all members get a chance to sail her.

Kay, Helen, and I wrote some last sail tributes to Explorer in her log. I have to say the last sail is bittersweet. I've covered the UK coast from Lowestoft to the Scillies plus visiting Holland, France, and the Channel Islands, over 3000 miles, on her since I joined.

Changing boats is absolutely the right thing to do for the club and will take us into a bright future. Being able to change the boat and having enough interest to want to

Ploes

Ploes is looking to be having an excellent year. In the middle of April we now have 16 weeks booked on Ploes and probably 18 weeks, I am confident that we could have 20 weeks or more booked by the end of the autumn period. There are 4 weeks available in October that are not yet booked and October is always a prime booking time. If we can achieve 20 weeks booked then that is £34,000 income, something worth aiming for to make an excellent year.

In February there were unexpected costs on Ploes, the servicing of Ploes engine had revealed pressurisation of the water hoses, this is now repaired and the engine is now running perfectly. The blown head gasket has been replaced and the skimmed head refitted, we hope that the engine is now good for at least another 10 years; the cost of this repair was very reasonable.

We have also now replaced the bow thruster battery (the old AGM battery was 10 years old), we have fitted the recommended 2 x 50a/h deep-cycle red-top Optima bow thruster batteries and we hope that the bow thruster will now perform perfectly. Every August we must remove the bow thruster propellers to clean them of barnacles. Last year they were not cleaned and they were heavily barnacled, this destroys their efficiency.

Ploes life raft was also due for servicing this spring, we had purchased it brand new in April 3 years ago. This servicing has been completed in April at a cost of £500. The main flare pack on Ploes is also very important and luckily these flares are not due for replacement until spring 2025. We have also replaced the fire extinguishers on Ploes, several dated from Greece and 2007, they were not fitted with pressure gauges and we were doubtful of their efficiency.

We also had plans to improve the passerelle. These plans unfortunately have not yet been completed but we hope that they will be completed in the next month. These plans involve widening the gap between the side stays, they are very narrow if you are getting a suitcase onto Ploes. We have also commissioned improved side posts on the passerelle.

Paul and I commissioned Ploes in the week starting the 11th March. This made Ploes ready for potential Easter bookings should they have occurred. Paul also organised two Experience weeks just after the commissioning and these were very successful. Although sleeping bags were needed as it was cool at night, it was warm during the day and we had good wind for sailing. Some restaurants were not open in the middle of March but they all planned to open for Easter.

We unfortunately still had weeks during the spring that were not booked, we will look at marketing these more next year. We noted that the flights to Fethiye are understandably dearer over Easter period and during May half term, this is a limitation but getting Ploes ready early this season means that there could be extra bookings.

Our main bookings occur in the period of June and July, this is before the normal August quiet period. Our new discount scheme in August has probably produced a



booking of 2 weeks and the flights then are a reasonable cost. This summer period is ideal for people with school children as it is during school holidays, but we unfortunately do not have many members with school aged children.

It is worth noting that if we did not have Paul's initiative to run Ploes Experience weeks, our bookings this year and last year would have looked very poor! The Experience skippers join the Experience weeks onto their existing bookings, that way we the Experience skippers (mostly) do not have to pay for additional flights out to Turkey. This helps us control skippers' extra costs.

Last year we sailed also during the first week of November. The sea was perfect for swimming and the temperatures were perfect, most facilities were open; this is another booking period in the year that we have not often used. Flights were cheap in the beginning of November, and this is a big attraction.

Media Report
